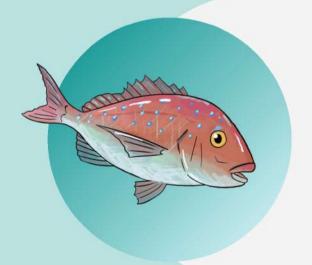
#### **INCREASED AWARENESS**

# STRATEGIC PLAN

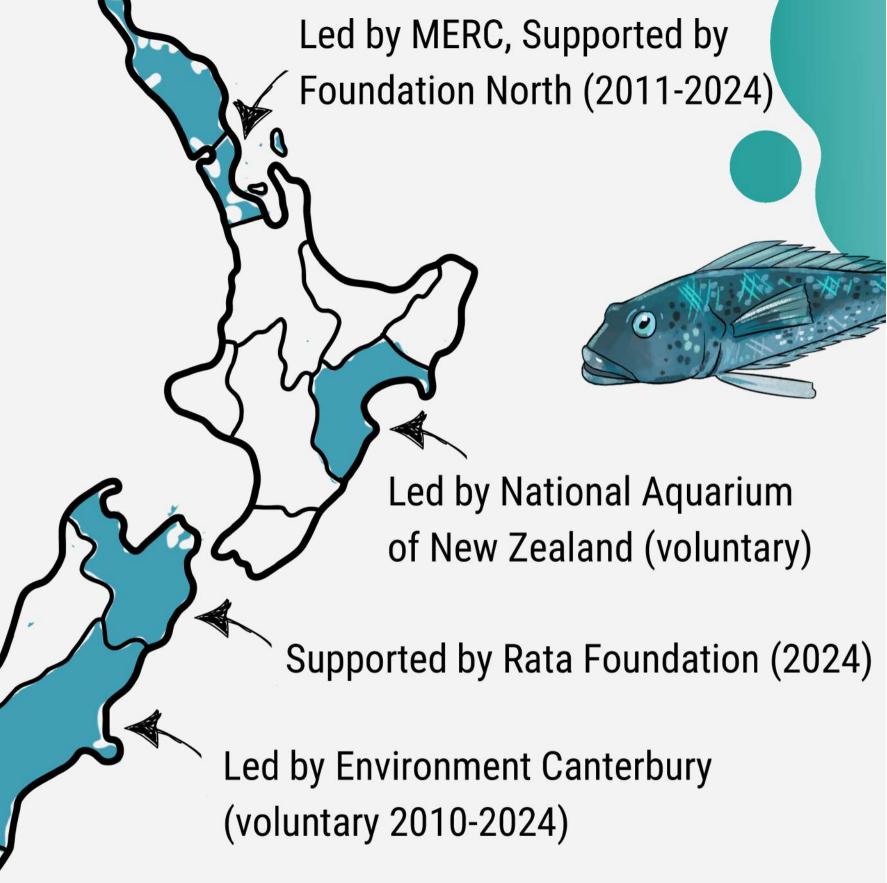
Increase the number of paid regional coordinators to increase the impact and number of events nationwide.
